He serves as Executive Director of the Baylor Center for Developmental Disabilities, which aims t promote the thriving of people with disabilities and their families. He joined the Baylor faculty in 2023. One strand of his research addresses the intersections of faith and disability. Dr. Carter's work in this area addresses the spiritual lives and flourishing of people with IDD and their families, the practices and postures of inclusive churches, and faith-based partnerships with disability service systems. A second strand explores the pathways to inclusion and belonging for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). He is particularly interested in capturing the reciprocal and lasting benefits that come through friendships and life lived together in community. seven books and more than 300 journal articles, chapters, and other publications. History of legislation regarding disabilities:

INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITY EDUCATION ACT (IDEA)

1973—Rehabilitation Act

1975—Education for All Handicapped Children Act (EHA)—Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) PL 94-142

1986 EHA reauthorized to include early intervention

1990 reauthorized to become IDEA, added TBI &

1997 reauthorized, emphasized access to the general curriculum, Developmental Delay allowed up to age 9

2004 reauthorized, greater identification and accountability to improve educational outcomes

AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA)

1990-ADA became law

2008—ADA law amended, more clearly defined "disability" as those impairments that impact tasks of daily living.

13 disability categories under IDEA:

1. Specific learning disability

2. Other health impairment

3. Autism spectrum disorder

4. Emotional disturbance

5. Speech or language impairment

6. Visual impairment, including blindness

7. Deafness

9. Deaf-blindness



- "I know he is a little old, but he would probably still best be cared for in the nursery."


- "It seems like a lot of energy and effort when we can't really be sure that Louise will actually get anything out of being in Sunday school with the other children."




